Paying for College: How to complete the FAFSA

Overview

This FAFSA completion lesson plan is designed to assist with the implementation of Nebraska's LB701/state statute 79-729, which requires the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) to be completed as a high school graduation requirement beginning with the class of 2025. Often referred to as "universal FAFSA," this law requires graduating seniors to either complete the FAFSA or complete an opt-out form.

Standards and Indicators:

Objective:

By the end of this lesson, students will understand the importance of filing the FAFSA, the necessary documents required, and the step-by-step process of completing the application. They will also understand the context for FAFSA completion as a high school graduation requirement in Nebraska.

Learning Objectives:

- Understand the significance of filing the FAFSA.
- Learn what documents are needed to fill out the FAFSA.
 - The FAFSA Checklist provides a detailed list of all necessary information
- Understand the steps involved in completing the FAFSA.
- Know how to avoid common mistakes when filling out the FAFSA.

Target Audience: High school seniors

Lesson Duration:

The lesson plan can be deployed in several ways, depending on the class time available.

Options include:

- One 50-minute class
- Three 30-minute class segments
- One block class schedule

Lesson Outline:

Introduction

Explain what the FAFSA is and its role in accessing federal student aid, including grants, work-study, and loans. Explain its role in the college funding process.

 Explain the Nebraska law that requires the FAFSA as a high school graduation requirement.

Importance of Filing the FAFSA

Why File the FAFSA?

- Discuss the importance of the FAFSA in securing financial aid.
 - 1. Show the FiveWaysEdPays video by the College Board
 - 2. Show the Federal Student Aid video What is the FAFSA? (2 minutes)
- o Highlight the types of aid available through the FAFSA (grants, work-study, and loans).
- Explain how the FAFSA can open up additional state and institutional aid opportunities.

2. Impact of Not Filing:

 Discuss the potential consequences of not filing the FAFSA, such as missing out on financial aid and scholarships.

Presentation

1. What is the FAFSA?

- Show the Applying for Financial Aid with the FAFSA Form video from Federal Student Aid (FSA) or present a short PowerPoint explaining the FAFSA.
- Discuss the types of aid available through the FAFSA, reference back to the FSA video, if desired

2. Documents Needed:

Review a checklist of documents required to complete the FAFSA

3. FAFSA Deadlines:

Highlight the importance of meeting federal, state, and college deadlines.

Demonstration

1. Creating an FSA ID:

 Guide students through the process of creating an FSA ID, which is needed to log in and sign the FAFSA form.

2. Step-by-Step FAFSA Completion:

- Use the FAFSA demo video to walk through each section.
- Emphasize key areas: personal information, dependency status, parent information, student information, and the confirmation page.

Hands-On Practice

1. Practice Completing the FAFSA:

- Allow students to practice filling out a sample FAFSA form.
 - Access the 2025–26 FAFSA® Prototype by following these steps.

Review the Prototype slides – found in the lesson plan slides.

Conclusion

1. Review Key Points:

- Summarize the main steps and important tips for completing the FAFSA.
 - o Reinforce the importance of submitting the FAFSA to access financial aid.

2. Next Steps:

Advise students on what to do after submitting the FAFSA, such as checking the status
of their application and understanding their FAFSA Submission Summary (FSS).
